CRAFT PROJECT: We'll be making a yo-yo pin. The pin is made of 3 yo-yo's of varying sizes. If you have a button jar, bring 3 buttons of different sizes to cover the centers of the yo-yo's. The smallest button should be at least 5/8" across. (We will have some buttons on hand also.) Also, bring scissors, needle, and thread.
