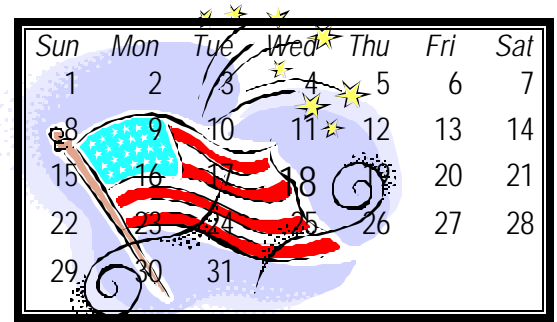


**Rockwell Collins CRAFT
