Notes From The Library By: Larry Lacy

Access to the Library—For you new members, there is a Guild Library available to anyone with a current Woodworkers Guild Membership card. The Library is in the short 2 door cabinet (under the phone) at Building 105 Entrance 2 (south west corner of 105). The guard will provide a key when you present your current membership card and ask for the key. Help yourself to the materials in the library, please use the checkout sheets in the three ring binder to record your transaction. (both coming and going). Library Usage-- The material checkout sheets indi-

cate that 14 library items were checked out by 6 different people during November. A total of 23 items remain checked out at this time. Please be sure to use the checkout sheets both when borrowing AND returning library materials!! Those who have had materials out for a month or more are requested to return the materials so others can use them.

Waiting for tools?-- There have been comments regarding the availability of tools (particularly the sharpener). In order to improve availability of our tools, the Guild leadership is recommending the following policy:

- If the tool you want to borrow is not available, open the checkout book to the BLUE Wait List page near the active checkout sheet—enter the name of the tool you want to borrow, your name, your phone number, and the date you were there. (Hopefully the current borrower will call you when the tool is back!)
- When you check out a tool, use it and bring it back as soon as possible (preferably within a week).
- When returning a tool, make sure you check in it by entering the return date on the checkout sheet
- Look on the BLUE Wait List to see if someone else is waiting for the tool your returning—if so call them at the number they left and advise them that the tool is back in the library. Please enter the date you

contacted them on the BLUE sheet as well.

This will conserve "wasted trips" to the library and minimize the time the tool sits unused.

By the way—PLEASE use the checkout sheet for tools as well as books!!! Its the only way we have of keeping track of the materials. Its hard to believe only two people have used the sharpener since we got it, but that is what the checkout sheet shows. (It is correctly checked out by someone as of 12-3--- THANKS!!)

New Tool for the Library



The club recently bought a Leigh D3 dovetail fixture. We were able to buy it from a fellow Rockwell employee for \$195. This is a considerable savings over the \$370 that the current D4 model sells for. The following is the Woodcraft catalog description for the Leigh dovetail fixture.

Hand cut dovetails can be difficult and time consuming to produce - especially when used in production, or semi-production manufacturing runs. Handmadelooking dovetail pins and tails are now easily produced with this jig, a router and some special cutters. Perfect fitting joints for tiny boxes or large case pieces can be produced in a variety of patterns by simply changing the adjustable guide fingers. Wooden pieces are clamped into the jig quickly and easily with the cam- action clamps which can be adjusted for different stock thickness in seconds, or used to repeat the same clamp tension instantly. Through or half blind dovetails can be easily set up by simply flipping the finger assembly over. Jigs are meticulously engineered, constructed of die-cast alloy, heavy aluminum and steel. Accepts boards up to 24" wide. Maximum pin thickness 1 1/4". Jig includes one 1/4" x 8° carbide dovetail cutter, one 5/16" x 1" carbide straight cutter with ½" shank, and instruction manual.

Additional uses suggested by Leigh are: finger joints, multiple splines, shelf-hole drilling and notching.

Kelley Kirtz will demonstrate how to use the jig at a future meeting. KK

Tool Shopping By: Roger Thompson

Check at Home First - Having sold my table saw, I was in the market for a replacement. I knew I wanted an up-scale contractor's table saw. I also wanted cast iron leaves and an extended table on the right side. Delta has such a saw being promoted as the Z package with a \$50 rebate. It included a 30 inch Unifence.

Tool Crib of the North and A-1 catalog stores quoted a price of \$799 after the \$50 rebate. With this price as a guideline I shopped-around locally by telephone to see if I could buy this saw for a price close to the discounted catalog prices.

I first called *Kel-Welco* in Iowa City. I was given a quote of \$799 plus the \$50 rebate. This made the final cost \$749. I then called *Puckett's* and got a quote of \$869. When told that I was a Rockwell Woodworks Guild member \$10 was taken-off, making it \$859 plus the rebate for a final cost of \$809. *Janda's* gave me a price of \$806 plus the rebate for a final cost of \$756. I told John I would buy the saw for that price and not haggle over \$7 when I could buy it at home. John insisted on reducing the price by the \$7.

Check at home before you buy ... I am glad I did!

Janda's - Roger Thompson talked with John, the store manager at *Janda's Tool Center*, about not being open on Saturdays. Several people have commented to Roger about not being able to shop there on weekends. These people are taking their business somewhere else. John told him, "It just has never been profitable for *Janda's* to remain open on Saturdays." However, they are now open until 6:00 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

For Sale

I recently purchased a new cabinet saw, and would like to sell my old table saw. It started life as a Sears cast iron 10" table saw. I have added extension tables on both sides of the saw (about 18" on the left and 48" on the right), and one of Larry Hoff's famous Biesmeyer-clone fences (completely indistinguishable from the real thing, some of the parts are even from Biesmeyer). The fence allows rips to 50" to the right of the blade. I have also added a dust collection port to the bottom. In addition, I have added the anti-vibration red link-belt and cast iron pulleys to the system. To top it all off, the whole thing is on a mobile base (the saw and extension tables move as one unit on a very sturdy base). I am looking for \$500 (or make an offer).


This will be our first organized field trip. We hope it will be enjoyable for everyone and set an example for more to come. KK

Future Field Trip By: Jim McCollum

This is a location we are considering for a field trip in late spring.

David Rath, a WOOD@ magazine reader from Elmhurst, Illinois, told me about a small sawmill called Timbergreen Farm, near Spring Green, in southwestern Wisconsin. He said that craftsmen from near and far went there to buy wood because there's such a large species selection and it's dried so carefully that it machines perfectly. The description was enough for me to schedule a visit.

Spring Green is a beautiful, charming town. Situated in a valley, it's flanked by wooded hillsides, dairy cattle graze the green meadows and several trout streams ripple their way to the Wisconsin River. The area is so naturally pretty that Frank Lloyd Wright chose a site there for his famed home and architectural school, Taliesin. A few miles out of Spring Green, the notion hit me that I really was headed somewhere special. I saw young walnut trees, obviously planted, standing straight like soldiers in a field. The hills held bright white birch mixed with aspen, oak, and other hardwoods. Pines and cedars filled in. At a white dairy barn, I turned in the direction indicated by a sign, "TIMBERGREEN FARM 2 MILES." After making my way into yet another valley, there it was.

Mixed species provide a woodworker's candy store

Jim Birkemeier was piling logs with his tractor when I arrived at Timbergreen Farm. His navy blue baseball cap and matching coveralls, his working "uniform," displayed the dust of his morning's efforts. (A consulting forester by profession, Jim works with his mom and dad, Helen and Bill, in a family operation.) The heart of "Timbergreen Farm's lumber business, Jim pointed out, was the opensided sawmill a high seven-year-old, 24-hp Wood-Mizer LT-40 band-saw mill. "One man, mostly me, can operate this," Jim noted. "It has a hydraulic lift, but I prefer to roll logs onto the mill from a raised deck. It's faster." "How much wood do you saw in a year?" was an obvious question. "Maybe 100,000 board feet," he said. Then, with obvious pride, Jim told me that nearly all the logs he saws come from the farm's 200 wooded acres. As a forester, he has developed a management plan with a goal of growing quality timber trees, such as red oak. But to give those trees room to grow means the selective harvest of lesser-used trees, too. Unlike clear-cutting, where an entire forest or portion of it is cut down, Jim's forestry

practice takes but a few scattered trees at a time. This keeps the Timbergreen forest-and others that he manages-productive forever.

"As a result," he said, "we harvest, saw, dry, and sell aspen, white oak, red oak, basswood, butternut, red maple, red elm, white elm, cherry, white ash, hickory, some walnut, white pine, and a little eastern red cedar. In our salesroom, I can have 40,000 board feet of kiln-dried wood in a mix of all those species."

Wood you have to sticker only once

"The wind always blows right up the valley into the stacks, no rnatter which direction it's coming from elsewhere," Jim pointed out, feigning wonderment as we gazed at part of the drying facility, one of two solar kilns that he designed and built. "The buildings add a venturi effect. That is, the wind whips through the stacks at a faster speed than we can feel outside. So, the wood air dries to 12 percent moisture in three months, winter or summer, instead of the usual six months to a year." As we inspected the air-drying wood that filled one of the buildings' three side-by-side chambers, Jim explained the process. "After the stickered wood in a chamber – 3,500 board feet divided into two piles – has air dried to 12 percent, we close the chamber with the sliding doors, making that chamber into a solar-heated kiln. "The air re-circulates from the lumber piles back up and through the solar collector," Jim added. "It takes about two months to get the boards to six percent moisture content." Having personally stickered wood to air dry, only to resticker it later in a kiln, I was impressed. Keeping the wood in one spot was something I hadn't seen anywhere before in my travels. Of course, Jim has learned about drying variables. "There's the thickness of the wood, and our Wisconsin weather," he chuckled. "I prefer to kiln-dry boards of the same thickness. When we can't do that, the thicker wood goes on top. At night, the heat rises, drying the upper boards a little faster. "The industry standard for loss [checking, cracking, etc.] during drying runs about seven percent," said Jim. "We have next to none. And there's no stress in the wood. That keeps customers coming back again and again."

I copied this from the Winter 1997 issue of *Wood magazine*. The last comment in this article said "Don't call, drop by!" Timbergreen Farm welcomes company and customers. The Birkemeiers do have a lumber price list ... but they



At the last meeting Roger handed out price sheets that he marked up to give special pricing on specific blades if we could get 5 sales. We have indications that there may be more that 15 blades wanted from various members. CRM has offered to make any blade available at 25% off the identified SALE price if we order a minimum of 15 blades of any type. That makes the Woodworker II 40 tooth 10" blade reduced from the sale price of \$119 to the new low price of \$89.25. This price includes shipping and there is not tax. What a deal, I am going to order two blades the Woodworker II and I for my table saw and radial arm saw respectively. To help you come to a similar conclusion I have reproduced part of a rating chart from the April 1998 American Woodworker that shows the Forrest Woodworker II is their highest rated of 19 blades. Some specific comments:

- A finely tuned saw is crucial. As an experiment, we adjusted the rip fence slightly out of alignment, and we got rougher cuts from all blades when ripping solid wood and cutting plywood.
- Rips are most revealing. The rip cuts we made in hard maple revealed the biggest differences in cutting quality. We got the smoothest rips in 6/4 maple from the Forrest Woodworker 11 blade-in fact, they look and feel like they just came off the jointer, ready for glue-up. Yes, you can actually rip glue line edges with a few of these combo blades. But there's a tradeoff in feed rate: Because a

combo blade has more teeth than a dedicated ripping blade, combination blades rip more slowly.

- Crosscuts are very, very good. We compared the crosscut edges produced by our combo blades with the edges produced by an 80-tooth crosscut blade. The best of the combo blades came pretty close, but they couldn't duplicate an 80-tooth blade's mirror finish.
- Material makes a difference. A blade's cutting smoothness varies with the materials and the type of cut. Some blades did better crosscutting than ripping (the Freud LU84R, for example), and some blades, such as the two DML models, produced better results cutting plywood than solid wood.
- Expect chipping in MCP. None of our test blades produced chip-free cuts in MCP. To achieve excellent cuts without chipping the brittle, super-thin melamine coating, we recommend a "high-ATB" or "triple-chip ATB" blade made especially for manmade materials. Or you can score along the cutting line with a mat knife before cutting with a combo blade.

Other Items:

Your steering committee has been working hard to plan meetings and events that we will all enjoy and hopefully benefit from. I want to thank the committee members for their dedication and effort, without which, we would not have a viable organization. **Thanks!**

The last news letter indicated Matt Versteeg and Marlan Modrow would provide programs for April and May. Both of these programs must be delayed due to conflicts. In looking at a March 1998 copy of the Des Moines Woodworkers Association News Letter I was interested in two specific items:

Lets consider the possibilities of officializing these duties. We have the same requirements and they are performed by our steering committee members, however we could someone to accept these specific responsibilities. Any volunteers?

Rec.Woodworking "Found on the Net" By: Wayne Hanson

Makita Sharpener:

I just purchased the Makita sharpening system. I have a new DeWalt planer and figured I would sharpen the blades. Anyway, I set up my Makita sharpener ... talk

about poor instructions. I really had no idea how to sharpen the blades. I don't understand how much water should be flowing over the stone?

If you're using the red (1200) stone, it should be enough to prevent the stone from glazing, but not so much that no slurry can develop. I guess that's something like a drop every second or two? Also, you should completely submerge this stone before using it (just till it stops bubbling). If you are using the coarse green stone, then flood the surface constantly, but don't bother presoaking.

I had a hard time setting up the appropriate angle ... not even sure what angle I should be using. DeWalt says 45 degrees and Makita says 40 degrees. I would just replicate the angle that's already on the blades. Stand to the side of the machine and sight down. When you think you've got it, take one or two passes and see the result. Adjust as necessary. When I slide the holder back and worth, how far should I go to either side? Does this matter?

First, you want to use just one side of the stone (the side turning toward you when facing the machine). If you try to use the whole surface, the blades won't ever sharpen straight. The way to accomplish this is to raise the left side of the rest about a 1/16th inch higher than the right. This will wear the stone so that it slopes away from the center, but this is what you want. As you sharpen, move the blade holder from left to right, all the way across the right side of the stone in even, steady passes. Release pressure for the return stroke and slide back to the starting position without touching the stone. You should find that the holder flexes just enough to allow you to sharpen, but, when you take you hand off the holder, the blade won't touch the stone.

And finally, how do I tell when the blades are sharp







enough? Should it take 30 seconds, 5 minutes, or what? Sorry for asking so many questions, but I am lost???? Once I've got everything set up, it takes me about 3 minutes to sharpen one blade with a 1200 stone, assuming I'm not correcting huge nicks. I've found that I end up drawing a burr, which I lightly remove on my bench stone.

Make sure to back off the adjustment screws on the blade holder once you've gotten the blade set at an even 5/16th inch projection and tightened the hold down screws. Backing off these adjustment screws reduces the chance of accidentally knocking the blade out of parallel with the holder while sharpening. Also, I have, on a couple occasions, managed to think that I had the stone seated correctly, when, in fact, I didn't. Make sure the stone is seated correctly in the detent before tightening the plastic wing nut.




Another book order is in process. I'll try to bring order information to the meetings so members can help pick.

3D Puzzle Patterns Available (Limited Time!)

Dennis Beaman gave an informative presentation on the craft of building wooden pen and pencil sets. brought several examples of his completed work and the tools that are required to build them. The sleeves can be made from a wide range of domestic and exotic woods especially those containing burls. Besides wood, certain plastics and cellulose acetate materials can be used - but requires a more delicate touch to avoid melting. Care must be given at several stages including drilling the blank, squaring the ends, and polishing the thin sleeve without burning it. Sandpaper ranging from 4,000 to 12,000 grit is used to get the fine polish necessary. Dennis mentioned several varnishes are available but his favorite is just using super-glue to achieve a very professional finish. Dave Sampsom gave a presentation on deck construction by outlining the work he done to build his own. After adding a four-season porch to his home, and as new siding was being installed, Dave determined it was a good opportunity to install a real nice deck. A magazine photo of a deck with lots of large curves and multiple levels caught his imagination and become the basis of the project. Dave made a set of drawings using a Computer Aided Design program and with help from his Architect, was ready to begin. Dave made special jigs for bending lumber to produce the graceful curves. The project took more than a year to complete and the result, as seen in the photos below, is magnificent. Remember, there are a lot of rules for building a deck - so review your local building codes before you complete your design! Great project Dave!



Last Meeting

The June meeting was held in the 35th street cafeteria with twenty-two members and guests in attendance, President Jim McCollum presiding. Jim called for additional volunteer help in planning meetings and researching and organizing future field trips.

Joan West gave us a speech on the evening's topic of scroll saw operation. She presented our group with a one-hour whirlwind version of what would be a multi-day class she teaches at Kirkwood Community College. Saw features to consider when purchasing, the best saw blades to stock, and what types of woods to select for the beginner was pointed out. There is actually a saw on the market for less than two-hundred dollars, one that an amateur could be very successful with. But be careful .. some of the discount lumber stores sell equipment that is totally unacceptable and will only discourage the student. Sign-up for Joan's next class and learn all about it. Joan brought several examples of her work and a photo album of beautiful filigree, lattice work, baskets, figurines, boxes, and clocks. She had several of her prize-winning projects published in Patrick Spielman's books and regularly submits her work to other scroll saw magazine publishers. Joan shared a lot of excellent hints and techniques with us and we thank her very much for the presentation.

Toys for Tots Project

One of our members has suggested that the Woodworkers Guild might supplement its Toys for Tots program with a program to build tiles of wood that can be used by blind students to help learn Braille. This idea came from the article that appeared in a recent issue of WOOD magazine which is attached as part of this article along with some information on the Braille alphabet. Guild member, Lee Johnson has volunteered to lead this effort. He has talked with one of the instructors who teaches at the school for the blind in Vinton and she thinks this would be a good tool to use in her classroom. It looks like they could use at least six sets.

Each of the 2-5/8 inch by 3 inch tiles are made from 3/4 inch hardwood. The basic alphabet consists of 25 tiles. What is needed from the club are three to four volunteers to help with the project and wood scraps that can be used to make the tiles. A variety of woods would be beneficial to help the students learn about the textures of different woods.

Lee has volunteered to champion this effort and has made up some sample tiles. He will leave a sample tile with Roger Thompson at the 124 South guard entrance and will have one in his office if you are interested in seeing what they look like. Also if you have scraps that can be used contact Lee at 295-3014 to make them available.

Pete Stephano's article in the January 1997 issue [of *WOOD* magazine], "Woodworkers to the Rescue," made me want to share a way that almost any woodworker can help others. Many woodworkers have saved small pieces of hardwood – pieces too big to throw away and too small to ever use. These scraps, along with 1/4" dowels, can become indispensable by turning

them into alphabet blocks for kids trying to learn Braille. - Ray Duffee, Boone, Iowa

Ray, we were so intrigued by your idea that we contacted Nancy Lavack, of the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired. Nancy told us that while there is some need in the U.S., other countries need these materials even more. One school in Nigeria has over 400 unsighted children and virtually no teaching tools. Readers, if you're interested in helping out, write to Nancy and she will send you a Braille chart with the 27 symbols you need to know. Every Braille symbol consists of different combinations of dots placed on a six-point grid. With 27 combinations, your set will help a child learn all the letters and numbers. Making extra blocks for some of the letters, like vowels, will allow the kids to spell simple words. If you want to spend an afternoon making a set, here are some tips that will help.


- 1. Make the blocks: Cut the scrap into $3/4 \times 2-3/8 \times 3-1/2$ " blocks. Each block will require from one to five 1/4" dowel pins. Drill the necessary 1/4" holes 3/8" deep, using the grid shown in the illustration. Round the edges, and sand each block.
- 2. Cut the 1/4" dowels into pieces 7/8" long. Sand the tops to a round shape so they will better simulate the actual required Braille type children will eventually read. Then, glue the dowel pins in the boles.
- 3. Leave the blocks unfinished: Blind children must "see" with their fingers, noses, and ears. Leaving the blocks unfinished gives the children an opportunity to feel and smell the differences between wood varieties. Consequently, not only will they be learning to read, they will begin to understand and appreciate wood. So, feel free to use a wide variety of woods in a set. Of course, avoid potentially toxic woods, such as cocobolo.
- **4**. Mark the blocks: So the kids will know (Continued on page 3)



which end is the top, saw a 1/8" kerf in the top of the block.

Also, write the kind of wood and the character represented on the back of each block This way, even teachers who don't know Braille or wood can help kids learn with your blocks.



Dave Wetzel and I (Wayne Hanson) had a nice discussion with Todd Dimmer of Eastern Iowa Supply, Inc. Eastern Iowa Supply is at 4601 sixth Street SW (across from Hawkeye Downs) and was previously know as Eastern Iowa Drywall Supply. They still sell a bunch of drywall but have expanded into the construction and industrial supply area. The store

has on hand most of the items in the DeWalt line, the Porter Cable line and the Milwaukee line. Todd gave us the \$2 tour and we saw all varieties of 3M sanding materials, Stanley tools, painter's masking tapes, a concrete mixer, rows and rows of nuts and bolts, ladders, extension cords and even a few woodworking things (Amana router bits, Starrett tools, dust masks, hearing protectors, power tools and accessories). This isn't quite like walking into a WoodSmith Store or a WoodWorker's Store but most anyone could find something to buy. The bottom line here is that he's offered us a significant discount for all the stuff in the store (excluding building material such as drywall and insulation). Todd indicated that he would give us the wholesale price (probably more accurately the contractor's discount) which is the price he gives his best customers. The discount is available to club members that show their membership card at the time of purchase. Rec.Woodworking

I follow the rec.woodworking on the Internet usegroup and have been following a thread (topic) called "the big stupid". The idea here is how each writer recovered from a dumb mistake during a project. What follows is my favorite.

My worst "Big Stupid" was during the construction of the Woodsmith Highchair. The plans call for the gluing up and then routing out the dish for the Highchair Tray. I decided to "improve" the glueup by using biscuits from my new Dewalt Biscuit Cutter. Well, when I went to rout out the dish portion of the tray, I managed to rout right into four of the eight biscuits, I'd put into the tray. When I noticed the biscuits, I discussed my intolerance, my family history, and the general state of the world in great length. So after another trip to the lumber store for more wood, I decided I should still use the bis-

cuits to strengthen the glue-up, but to offset the depth of the biscuits to account for the "dish" being routed. Everything was going fine, glueup was flat, minimal sanding, and the grain matched between the boards. With great care I started routing, the only problem was that I had accidentally flipped the piece upside down while admiring my workmanship. Again I routed into four biscuits. When I noticed the biscuits showing, I turned off the router and walked into the house and left the whole mess sitting there for a week. When I finally got the courage to start again, I followed the plans exactly and it worked perfectly. The two other glueups, I used for other projects. I still keep one peice of wood with the biscuit showing to remind me to think about what I'm doing and just because I have a new tool does not mean I have to use it on the project I'm working on.

Membership applications and 1999 dues were collected during the meeting. I understand that approximately twenty-five members renewed their membership at the meeting. THANKS!!!








proximately half price (\$9.50) in quantities of 10 or



Last Meeting

The October meeting was held in the 35th street cafeteria with 22 members in attendance, President Scott Nesseler presiding. The main topic of the evening was opening our annual Toys for Tots program. Dean Robinson gave a brief overview of our goals, distribution plan, safety rules, and example toys. We are setting a goal this year of at least one hundred toys to be distributed in conjunction with the Rockwell Collins Employees Adopted Family program. Dean displayed several plans for simple puzzles, cars, trucks, and trains. This year the club will purchase wheel kits for members that are building cars, trucks, planes, etc. Dean pointed-out several assembly techniques that will assure a safe toy for young children. For example; wheels and small parts must be securely glued to avoid removal and railroad train sets should be connected by magnets rather than hooks and eyes. Finishes, if used, should be non-toxic paints or simple oils like olive or other vegetable oils. Roger Thompson, Dean and Emil Krepick brought an excellent display of toys that they, and other members, have built in the past. Emil explained his technique of building home-made wheels using a hole saw, counter sink, and sanding belt. Making your own wheels allows the toy-builder a greater design freedom and helps make a more interesting product.

Roger Thompson is conducting another Forrest-brand saw blade purchase for Guild members. Last fall, Roger assembled over \$4300 in purchases saving approximately \$1300 for our members. See the October Knot Knews article to see if you want to join in. Your printed copy has a Forrest brochure. The Forrest Company produces excellent carbide saw blades and saving 25% off the sale price is a bonus that Roger is providing the Guild. Roger say's, "orders should be in by the November 14th meeting." He will place the order on November

20th. Note, This offer is for Guild members only!

Lee Johnson and his team have been working diligently on their Braille Block Program. So far, they have produced 7 sets of the wooden Braille training blocks for the School for the Blind in Vinton, IA. Each set has 28 blocks with protruding dowels representing the letters and numbers. The block will be used by students to learn the Braille language. See the July Knot Knews Article. Lee will be presenting the completed products soon at the school in Vinton. Many thanks to Lee and his hard-working group - Ron Kositzky, Roger Thompson, Ed Kalous, Larry Lacy, John Cox, Jim Mc Collum, and Dave Wentzel. Together they assembled 196 blocks with 700 holes & dowels, sanding 1176 faces, and 2352 edges.




Toys for Tots Program



GARAGE & WOODSHOP WORK SAFETY TIPS

With my left foot in a cast, I've had lots of time to think about what happened. Why did I get into a position risk hurting myself needlessly? How can I prevent accidents from occurring in the future?

Ceasing work in the garage or shop isn't considered an option to prevent accidents for many of us. We enjoy working in the woodshop or on our cars. I plan to continue to do so in the near future but not without becoming more safety conscious. I will use the following guidelines to reduce the potential of and/or prevent accidents from happening in the future.

First, remember that you have friends that will gladly help on a heavy job if you just call and make arrangements a short time ahead. A second person may also see potential safety considerations you missed. Two heads are better than one at these times.

Second, don't start any task that has safety risks late in the evening after finishing other work. You are not thinking clearly about safety at this time of the day. The goal to get it done yet today clouds your thinking. Of course it's also too late to call for the help you know is needed, so you don't. This is the time of day accidents happen, as can be verified by the steady string of hurting souls to the emergency room along with yours truly in the late evening.

Third, consider what you must do to get the job done. How many things must occur at once? Does anything pertain to safety? Remember that your mind can only concentrate on one task at a time. You will concentrate on the details to accomplish the task while the safety consideration goes into the background. All of a sudden with no warning, the accident will occur while you were totally absorbed in the complexity of the task, completely forgetting you had to do another simple task relating to safety at the same time. If there is a safety factor involved with getting the job done don't attempt to do it. Get help, or build something to eliminate the accident potential.

Last, if you ignore the above and still attempt the work, be sure someone is around to drive you to the hospital, and take along your proof of insurance. If you are "lucky," you may eventually return to normal given enough healing time and money.

We're several months into the club's new year so it's a good time to recap what we did last year and talk about what our plans are for this year.

First lets talk about last year. We spent 41% of our funds on books, videos, and project plans. The Library List will be published several times a year in the *Knot Knews* and is always available on the Guild homepage. We have over 100 books and videos that cover a wide range of topics. If you have any suggestions for new books Larry Lacy would be happy to hear from you.

Secondly, we spent 40% of our funds on tools. These include the Leigh Dovetail Jig, the Delmhorst Moisture Meter, and the Drill Doctor Drill Bit Sharpener.

Thirdly, we spent 10% of our funds on door prizes for meetings and the remainder on food for meetings and other misc. items.

What's the plan for next year? The executive committee has established the budget for 98/99 and expect to spend 30% of our budget on the library, 35% on tools, 10% on door prizes, 15% on food for meetings and 10% on toy projects. We plan on continuing our purchases of books for the library and tools for member's use as well as monthly door prizes at each meeting and food and soda at a meeting or two. We would appreciate any suggestions for books and tool purchases. Because of corporate liability issues, we cannot purchase "cutting tools" such as router bits or saw blades. We already have received several good suggestions on new tool items and will be considering those.

Door prizes will consist of one or two low-cost items each month and a more expensive item a few times a year.

Forrest Saw Bl ades By: Roger Thompson


Most of the saw blades have arrived and have been distributed. Six sets of dato blades and John's stiffeners are coming.
